We are currently living through a transitional period in which both assumed legal normativity and power structures are undergoing disruptive challenges. In consequence, the legal and diplomatic representatives of states today find themselves playing decisive roles in shaping international law. In which directions and through which practices do these actors seek to develop the international legal order to come?

This roundtable discussion brings together scholars and practitioners to focus on these developments, by directing attention towards questions of 'international legal policy' in the sense of national *political* approaches towards international *legal* rules and institutions. Moreover, the roundtable examines the evolving role of *diplomacy* at the interface between competing and overlapping policy approaches, which is both shaped by the medium of international law, as well as constructing the international legal order in turn.
